

Programme Note

Seder is a dance-theatre work by poet and interdisciplinary artist **Adam Kammerling**.

Inspired by the Jewish ritual of the Seder, a shared act of remembering and storytelling, the piece explores how stories of survival are passed between generations, and how they continue to shape our present. Drawing on Kammerling's own family history, including his grandfather's experience as a Kindertransport evacuee, *Seder* reflects on inherited memory, grief and resilience, and the quiet questions that live alongside them.

Originally due to tour in 2024 the project was postponed due to safety concerns in light of unfolding geopolitical events. This postponement gave essential space to reconfigure the work and consider the impact of Adam's position as an artist retelling a Jewish story of survival. Deeply frustrated at the ongoing lack of action or response in the face of Israel's actions in Gaza, defined a genocide by the UN Independent International Commission of Inquiry in September 2025, Adam returned to the piece with new questions and a renewed direction.

Created as a contemporary ritual, *Seder* unfolds through a close relationship between text, movement and live score. Performers and musicians share the space, moving between moments of tenderness and intensity. Harp and percussion sit alongside heavier musical influences, creating a sound world where tradition and disruption coexist.

Seder is an invitation to gather, to listen, and to reflect together, to hold stories of survival with care, complexity and honesty. It aims to interrupt the silencing narratives surrounding anti-semitism and Palestine, and demands a renewed consideration of our survival stories; how we tell them, and why.

Concept, writer & Performer

Adam Kammerling is an award-winning poet, interdisciplinary artist and educator. His debut poetry collection *Seder* (Out-Spoken Press) was a finalist in the National Jewish Book Awards. His stage work includes the acclaimed spoken word/dance shows *Shall We Take This Outside and Inside!*, with commissions for the BBC, The Orwell Prize, Nationwide, Upswing Circus, and Slide Dance. He was founder and programme lead of *The Nest*, a UK-wide interdisciplinary arts programme for care-experienced young people delivered with The Fostering Network between 2019-2025.

Leo Kay is Artistic director of long-term collaboration *Unfinished Business*. His work as a director, and performance maker has moved through Physical Theatre, spoken word,

cross-disciplinary performance, intimate autobiographical performance, and his current social art practice. He has directed and facilitated process in many contexts including Contact Theatre, Birmingham Rep, The Roundhouse and for many artists, including Polarbear, jo Fong, Ria Heartly, Malika booker and Baba Israel. Performers
